

Some base facts

Six depots:

- Bristol Hengrove
- Bristol Lawrence Hill
- Bath (& Westbury, Wilts)
- Weston-s-Mare
- Wells
- 1800 staff
- 1400 drivers
- 600 buses
- 60m passenger journeys per year
- Patronage rising year on year 7-10%



Present situation

- 50% customer increase since 2013 and continuing...
- Fairer Fares to Faster Fares the smart revolution
- The challenge of Congestion
- Environment: changing attitudes and behaviours
- New investment £150m on Euro VI buses
- Profitability why it's needed



How things work

De-regulated Market:

- Operators may provide the services they wish at any time and any fare on any road...
- Competition is encouraged
- Local authorities have the power to fill gaps in the network by letting tenders for subsidised operations
- Public sector finances under pressure
- Over 90% of our operation is commercial
- ENCTS is a national scheme

What is metrobus?




- New rapid transit network for Bristol and South Gloucestershire
- Joint project between Bristol City Council, North Somerset Council and South Gloucestershire Council
- metrobus is made up of three individual routes with infrastructure costing approximately £230m to develop:
 - M32 bus-only junction
 - 2.5km Guided Busway
 - Bristol city centre bus priority improvements
 - Over 6km of new road space (4.5km SBL; 1.6km SGTL)
- First service launched May 29th 2018
- 10 years in the making!
- m2 launched Sept 3rd 2018.



Why is metrobus different?

- metrobus is different to conventional bus services as:
 - all tickets are sold off the bus
 - simpler fares
 - dedicated bus infrastructure such as a new Guided Busway & M32 BoJ
 - buses are high quality and environmentally friendlier
 - high standards set for punctuality and reliability and general service delivery.
- metrobus is an exciting opportunity to increase bus use in Bristol and surrounding areas by providing a faster, more customer centric, reliable and timely service to customers.
